From the Pastor's Desk

My Dear People:

There is a flyer in this bulletin on "convert stories", people searching for the truth, shopping around for certainty in the faith, or leaving the faith and then somehow coming back like a new convert. These true narratives help us realize how much people APPRECIATE the faith. Sometimes, we who are born Catholics are like those "born with a silver spoon in their mouths", not appreciating what they have without working for it.

We have a local "convert story" that not only makes us appreciate our faith, but has a secondary lesson: Importance of a simple invitation.

Ash Wednesday 2017, two pharmacists are in conversation. The one, Laura Vizzina, Catholic, tells the non-Catholic about the evening Mass at OLS that Ash Wednesday. He had asked a couple questions about the Catholic faith before, so she INVITED him to the evening Mass on Ash Wednesday. He has come to Mass ever since, and not just Sundays, but DAILY Mass before he goes to work. He is signed up for the RCIA class and his wife is also going to come. Their daughter is already coming to the Parish School of Religion on Sundays.

The second lesson in this narrative is that, while God makes the converts with His Graces, we are supposed to give the INVITATION, as did Laura Vizzina this recent Ash Wednesday.

By virtue of our baptism we are to be "missionaries". That simple invitation can mean so much. We don't force or badger people. Most people feel complimented that we invited them to Church and to the RCIA Class. I think half of us know someone who would at least appreciate the invitation. The

class starts on October 2, this year. Think about extending the "INVITATION" if you know someone who might be interested.

In John's Gospel, Chapter 1, Phillip extended an invitation to Nathaniel (alias Bartholomew). He tells him that he (Phillip) has found the Messiah. Nathaniel is skeptical and says, "Can anything good come from Nazareth?" Phillip says to him, "COME AND SEE!" When Nathaniel sees Jesus, Jesus tells him something only God could know and BAM, Bartholomew becomes one of the 12 Apostles.

With the foundation and history of the papacy, along with the Biblical references of Jesus' presence in the Eucharist, I find it easy to explain the faith to those interested.

My two messages from this desk this Sunday are: 1) Appreciate the faith like a convert and; 2) Extend the invitation to those searching; they are more numerous than most of us think.
