From the Pastor's Desk

My Dear People:

Next Sunday is the Feast of Christ the King. Think about this for a moment. How long does a king live? King Louis XVI died at the age of 34. Julius Caesar died at the age of 56. Napoleon Bonaparte died at the age of 52. When a king dies, who cheers him centuries later? Caesar is a blurred image on an ancient Roman coin. Napoleon has a tomb somewhere in Paris. But who would do anything for these kings of the past? There is only one King who has been seen alive by hundreds of people after His death. Today a billion people hang on His every word and would do anything for Him. This means that He should be number one in our lives!

When I was attending McGill High School in Mobile, we had a parade downtown in honor of Christ the King. It was led by the local bishop carrying the monstrance containing Christ our King. All the Catholic school children were in that parade! We acknowledged Christ as our personal King.

How did we get incorporated into His kingdom whereby He is our personal King? It happened at baptism when God took us from darkness into light and into the kingdom of His beloved Son.

Every baptized person belongs to His kingdom and should celebrate Jesus as King. When Pilate asked Jesus, "Are you King?" Jesus did not deny it but admitted it and said His kingdom was not of this world. He would not be a material King even though the whole material world is His. He wants to be King of our hearts and souls.

We see Christ our King as an example of reaching out to all people, even the marginalized, when He promises the "good thief" a place in His kingdom. That good thief

always makes me wonder. He must have been seeking the "true," the "good," and the "beautiful," and he found it in the most superior and God-like way in Jesus of Nazareth. He had the grace to see Jesus as a King saying, "Remember me when you enter into your kingdom," and Jesus answered, "This day you will be with me in paradise (my kingdom)." Somehow, in the midst of all the human degradation, the good thief recognized Someone who rose above it all.

Congratulate Jesus next Sunday on His Kingship. Every day, but especially next Sunday, we see Jesus as our King and pray, "Lord, remember us and help us enter into your eternal kingdom."

The R.C.I.A. Class has not been cancelled; it has been modified to cut back in every way on the spread of the virus (the VIP Masses have been temporarily cancelled). Ann Marie Verchot and I have decided that with the 15 people and more joining the class all the time, until the first of the year, we have asked those interested (15) to listen to the CD's of the 20 topics each week, and during the week discuss the topic of the week "online" with a group leader.

Fr. Muller (or Anne Marie Verchot) will meet with any new members at 7 p.m. in the Parish Hall on Monday nights. Fr. Muller will also meet with existing members of the class individually on Monday nights at 7 p.m. to get to know people and to answer any questions about the faith.

The old Gorrie-Regan building property is not a dead issue. The following is a summary of the issue. The Zoning Board voted 7-0 that we could pave the property for extra parking (closer than the far end of the parking deck, which is a long walk). Parking on the Library property is getting to be a problem for the future, since the Library keeps building and expanding. The City Council was to approve the Zoning Board's recommendation. The whole thing took a wrong turn when two Catholics on the Council recused themselves

from the vote and OLS lost the vote. Those who were on the Council and voted against us claimed they did not know all the issues.

Last month the Council voted that they could change their own vote, and on NOVEMBER 30th THEY WILL VOTE AGAIN. I say all this because I don't think I should be the only one praying for the positive "go ahead" with the parking area. We need some extra prayers. God does listen to every prayer!!!! Yes, the answer from God is "yes" or "not yet" or "I have a better plan." However, the "yes" answer from God depends on how many requests and how strong the prayer.


