From the Pastor's Desk

My Dear People:

Many people are so busy with the day's work, that they lose track of the whole picture, the real goal of our lives. The whole picture is our eternal life with God. Sometimes, working for this enormously great goal gets put on the back burner and sometimes off the stove.

In the work on devils, C.S. Lewis describes the senior devil teaching the junior devils that the best way "to get" people is to convince them that there is "no hurry." When the last sickness comes, and we can barely say one prayer because of sickness or semi-consciousness, we postponed all that prayer for our final sickness...but then we feel so sick we can barely offer one prayer. Yet, developing a relationship with God is the whole purpose of our lives on earth.

The Church, in her wisdom, gives us the Advent season for us to stop and see the whole picture, the indescribable importance of our salvation. Yet, custom and the secular world make the weeks before Christmas the busiest weeks of the year. So, the Church puts an emphasis on Advent, so that this great season is a season of extra prayers and good works to really celebrate the birth of the Savior.

Doesn't it bother us to have people say, "Happy Holidays," in order to avoid the word Christmas, which carries with it the name of Christ? The more nativity scenes the better, on our cards, in our homes and in our yards. The Advent wreath, with the evergreen foliage that survives the winter, reminds us that we can survive the winters of our lives.

There is a two-fold aspect of our Advent readings: 1) The historic longing and waiting for the First Coming of Christ in Bethlehem, and 2) The Second Coming, when He "comes back to take us to Himself." We need to delve into the Old Testament history, reading about Isaiah and other prophets predicting the coming of Jesus. The first aspect is satisfied when we celebrate on Christmas the actual coming of Jesus in that Infant in Bethlehem. The Second Coming of Christ is the longing for heaven. We may not know we have that longing, but as we experience one desire after another on this earth, we say with St Augustine:

LORD, OUR HEARTS WERE
MADE FOR YOU AND THEY
WILL NEVER REST UNTIL THEY
REST IN YOU.

I love the way Thanksgiving rolls right into the Advent season because we need to keep the spirit of giving thanks right through Advent, thanking God for the Gift of all gifts, the gift of His Son born in Bethlehem.

Advent is a holy season, meaning extra prayers or extra effort in the daily prayers we say already. We know the greatest of prayers is the offering of Jesus to the Father at Mass on Sundays and, if possible, during the week.
