From the Pastor's Desk

My Dear People:

Rejoice Sunday: There is a celebrated passage in the book of Ecclesiastes stating that all things have their seasons:

A time to be born and a time to die.
A time to destroy and a time to build.
A time to mourn and a time to dance, etc.

In the Christian era, we add:

A time to rejoice and a time to keep
rejoicing in the birth of the Savior.

There may be deaths to mourn, sicknesses to suffer, and economies to recover, but there will always be the time to rejoice that we have a Savior.

1st Reading:

“I rejoice heartily in the Lord.”

Responsorial Psalm response:

“My soul rejoices in my God.”

2nd Reading, 1st Thessalonians:

“Rejoice always.”

In the Gospel today, they were thinking that John the Baptist was so great. He might have said: Rejoice, there is one coming after me so much greater than I that I am not worthy to loose his sandal straps.

The birth of Jesus is so great, we just can't celebrate this on one day, which comes and goes so fast. So, we start rejoicing on the third Sunday of Advent. “New Year's” is the Octave of Christmas; it is really eight days after the feast, and it celebrates the birth of Jesus, His taking on human flesh. It used to be called the Feast of the Circumcision and is now called the Motherhood of Mary (Jesus taking on human flesh). The theme of rejoice is explicitly celebrated until the baptism of

Jesus in the river Jordan. It is then that we take down the nativity scenes. Yes, every nativity scene should be saying and singing “Joy to the world, the Lord has come.”

Today is Tithing Sunday. Thank you, on behalf of our benevolent God, to those who have been so generous this past year in supporting the parish. It allows us to serve so many people and guide them in the direction of God.

The procession to the altar is so impressive (please, 6-foot distances as we process after the Homily to place our pledge cards into a basket, which is placed at the altar of God). The pledge card is a way of admitting that everything we have comes from Him, and so He gets the first part of what we earn. It means that we trust in His continued blessings; it means that we love Him with the proof that we are willing to sacrifice for Him.

Let there be nativity scenes all over the world in order to keep Christ in Christmas. Keep viewing these scenes of the birth of the Savior and keep saying: THANK YOU, JESUS, A MILLION TIMES!
