From the Pastor's Desk

My Dear People:

Today is the Feast of the Baptism of Jesus by John the Baptist, and, at first, it puzzles us that this baptism, for the forgiveness of sins, is something Jesus sought and requested of St. John.

In St. Matthew's Gospel, we read that John the Baptist did not want to do this. He, John the Baptist, said that it was Jesus who should be baptizing John, but Jesus insisted that He (Jesus) be baptized.

When we look at the life of Jesus, we see that the purpose of His life is to save us from our sins, since we humans are infinitely below the Almighty and could not help ourselves as sinful people. The purpose of Jesus being baptized is that THIS WAS HIS FIRST PUBLIC ACT OF PENANCE FOR THE SINS OF THE HUMAN RACE.

This baptism of Jesus is in fact the Lord saying to His Father:

"Give them another chance."

Jesus, representing the human race, is saying:

"Father, on their behalf I am sorry for their sins. Forgive them, please."

The most unfortunate thing about our human race is that we do not appreciate enough that Jesus' life, death, and resurrection was all on behalf of "forgiveness of the sins of the human race." It is like enjoying good health. WE just take it for granted and don't appreciate health until we are sick, and writhing in discomfort, and longing for the return of our health. When health returns, we take this gift from God with little appreciation, and so it is with the salvific life of Jesus of

Nazareth. We take the indescribable gift of salvation "for granted". That entitlement attitude is like the teenager with the family car!

So, this Feast of the Baptism of Jesus, the first public act of repentance for our sins, is a reminder of what we tend to forget.

Jesus told His apostles to go out and preach and baptize those who accept Jesus with a baptism of water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. By this baptism, Jesus incorporates one into His family. By this baptism, we are promised heaven. By this baptism, Jesus commits to living within us. This never ceases to amaze me...that we are temples of God. It is so biblical; we must believe it! When we say our prayers, talking to God, the line is never "busy", nor is there the statement: "Leave a message."

Also, by our baptism, we are members of the lay priesthood. Yes, we participate in the priesthood of Jesus. St. Peter clearly writes to all baptized:

"You are a chosen race, a <u>royal</u> <u>priesthood</u>, a holy nation, etc."

So, after the consecration at Mass, the priest does not say "I" but "we" offer you, Father, this life-giving Bread, WE offer you this saving cup.

It all seems to say that the day of our baptism is more important than the day of our physical birth.

So, this feast of the first public act of repentance Jesus did for our sins – His submission to baptism – is such an important feast. It is another feast celebrating Jesus for being our SAVIOR.

<u>So many thanks</u> to you for the cards and gifts sent to us priests and the office. You are such thoughtful and generous people.

Thanks, also, to the 375 people who turned in pledge cards. At this time last year, we had 500 cards. It is the virus that has created the shortfall. We know the social distances keep the full congregation from coming. Yet, at Christmas, it was great to see, with nine Masses, how many came. We are \$250,000.00 from our goal, but happily the pledge cards are still dripping in. Even small amounts pledged show we are still here and trying our best. Again, an abundant thanks!
