From the Pastor's Desk

My Dear People,

Ann Montalbano was prayerfully ushered into heaven this past week. She is the mother of Angie Dunston and five other children.

Last Thursday, Jane DeMeis and I went to see Ann, giving her the “last rites”: Anointing of the sick, the Apostolic Blessing, and Jesus, Himself, in the Eucharist, which she was able to receive. The next day, Friday, she was able to receive Jesus again, given by Sister Madeline Contorno, friend of the family, and Saturday, all six children continued to be, for five days, by her side. With Hospice called in, the six children, locally and from Houston, Texas, Mobile, and Pensacola, were at her bedside waiting for the Lord to say, “Ann, come to me.”

The lesson to be learned here is the great example of FAITH and DEVOTION of the six children when a parent is dying. What were they doing for five days? Talking to God and to their mother. The fact is that Saturday, around noon, the children had just finished the fifth decade of the Rosary when Ann experienced that unique moment of the separation of the spirit from the body. I am convinced that Ann’s spirit went straight to God. Her life was full of love of a husband, Sam, for 68 years, and a love for those six children. All of that love coming from her great faith and love of God.

Sam and Ann Montalbano transferred to OLS because Angie Dunston, Director of Mom’s Day Out, was their caregiver, and Angie has been a devout member of OLS for some 30 years. Sam and Ann’s lives centered, by their own statement, around their FAITH, FAMILY, and then so many other things, like travelling. When their health permitted, daily Mass was their first priority!

The Rosary was also apart of their faith journey. I don’t think anyone could compete

with Sam’s ten years of making rosaries for hours every day, which were sent overseas. The total number must be a couple thousand.

The reality of all those “Hail Mary’s” is best understood with the realization that the apex of the prayer is BLESSED IS JESUS CHRIST. Yes, Biblically, it comes from Elizabeth greeting her cousin, Mary, with the words: BLESSED IS THE FRUIT OF YOUR WOMB (JESUS). So, each Hail Mary is a prayer of praise to Jesus, our Savior. The human additive is asking Mary to help us pray as we say, “...pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.”

Contrary to many critics of our Catholic faith, we do not worship Mary. We ask her to help us pray to God. Yes, she is only human, but a unique human who gave flesh to the God-Man and who showed such powers of convincing Jesus on something (making more wine, miraculously) at the wedding feast of Cana. Jesus actually changed His schedule for the first public miracle and did what Mary asked Him to do. Can one imagine asking Mary hundreds of times to pray for us at the hour of our death and when we are dying, she turns her head the other way? At the hour of Ann Montalbano’s death she received everything the Church could give her as the Church administered the sacraments of the Anointing, the Eucharist, and the Pope’s own blessing a Catholic priest can give a dying Catholic to which is attached a plenary indulgence. One requirement on the part of the dying person is no attachment to sin

What motivates me to say all those Hail Mary’s is a quick reflection on the various mysteries connected to Jesus and the words of praising Jesus (Blessed is the fruit of your womb, Jesus) and, also, that constant request for Mary to pray for me at the hour of my death.
